

# Abstract

One copy needs to be handed in by the Monday before the science fair. All students that qualify for the regional science fair will read their handed-in abstract during the awards ceremony. Below is an example of how to write an abstract. Keep it brief, less than 250 words, but complete.

The abstract is a brief overview of the project. It should not be more than one page and should include the **project title, a statement of the purpose, a hypothesis, a brief description of the procedure, the results, and your conclusion**. There is no one way to write an abstract, but it should be brief. Often, a copy of the abstract must be submitted to the science fair officials on the day of judging. It might also be used to prepare an introduction or you may be asked to read it if you are a first place or honorable mention winner.
